



The Lower Kootenay Band or Yaqan Nu?kiy is one of five communities of the larger Ktunaxa Nation, whose traditional territory includes the Creston Valley and Kootenay Lake area. Yaqan Nu?kiy means "where the rock stands" referring to an important place in the Creston Valley. The people of Yaqan Nu?kiy speak the Ktunaxa language, which is one of the eleven original aboriginal language families in Canada, not related to any other language in the world.

The people of Yaqan Nu?kiy settled along the Kootenay River and Kootenay Lake, using the Kootenay Canoe (Yaksumit) to travel up and down the Kootenay River, into the wetlands and Kootenay Lake for all sustenance activities. The canoe was also an important part of the social, ceremonial and religious activities.


The Yaksumit is known for its unique design, with its sturgeon nose shape, front and back, the canoe lies flat from stern to stern.

Today the Lower Kootenay Band and Yaqan Nu?kiy Community continue to play a strong and vital role in the community, with the band operating a number of important local businesses, the Yaqan Nu?kiy Independent school, and having just opened their beautiful new administrative building, shaped like the Yaksumit.

The Creston Valley Tourism Society acknowledges this area as part of the unceded territory of the Ktunaxa people and is grateful for the opportunity to live, play and share these beautiful lands and waterways with our visitors.



**WE** invite you to discover the region in the Kootenays where east meets west known as the Creston Valley.

The temperate climate and expansive views are what attract visitors year-round, with deep roots in agriculture, an array of recreational opportunities, and a surprising artisanal scene that keep them coming back.

From the picturesque banks along the Moyie River in Yahk to the meandering waters of the Kootenay River running north through the Creston Valley before flowing into Kootenay Lake, the communities are connected by both land and history.

Travelling from the east, the small community of Yahk boasts camping opportunities along the Moyie River, thrifting, and of course the infamous goats atop the roof at the Soap and Candle Co.

Orchards and fruit stands in **Erickson** have drawn visitors and families for generations. Here you will find a bounty of locally grown fruits and vegetables, baked goods and sweet and savory preserves to prepare your own feast or take home. Wineries specialize in cool-climate wines and are happy to host you in their tasting rooms.











**Creston**, the commercial and business hub of the Valley, has a vibrant downtown worth stopping for. Standing tall in the center of the town, the two historic grain elevators overlook the valley alongside an impressive assortment of restaurants and charming cafés, state-of-the art recreation facilities, theatres and galleries, cool and quirky shops, a variety of professional services, and more.

Canyon is the gateway to Mt. Thompson, and an outdoor enthusiast's paradise offering some of the best hiking and views around. The beautiful community park offers camping, ball fields, a horse arena, playground, and spacious community hall.

Further south you'll find **Lister**, another country paradise offering dairy, grain, beef, and poultry farming. Stop by the **Kootenay Meadows fromagerie**, take a peek inside the barns, meet the cheesemakers, watch the robotic milking process, and say hi to the cows!

West of the Kootenay River you'll find West Creston and the Creston Valley Wildlife Management Area, with opportunities to view a diversity of wildlife and access year-round trails for hiking, biking, snowshoeing and cross-country skiing.

To the north **Wynndel** offers a winery and craft distillery open for tastings and a short drive away, **Duck Lake** has exceptional bass fishing and scenic ice-skating come winter.

While the Creston Valley has become known for its growing season and agriculture, what sets it apart is the quality of people that call it home and shape these communities as farmers, artists, entrepreneurs and families. It's a place where you'll not only discover fresh food, but friendly, hard-working, down-to-earth folks who share a love for the valley.

IT'S true, the Creston Valley is a four-season destination, with something on offer any time of year. Take a look and find out why!

spring comes early in this part of BC, which not only allows for an earlier growing season, it allows for earlier... everything! With warmer weather, trails are clear and ready for exploring and avid bikers, hikers and runners are out enjoying the trail network. The golf season at Creston Golf Club also opens for the season, sometimes as early as March! In Erickson, the colourful and optimistic cherry blossoms draw visitors. Starting in May, the award-winning Farmers Market begins running its extremely popular outdoor markets each Saturday.

In **Summer**, it continues to heat up and visitors and residents alike take to cooling off in the lakes and rivers, at the splash park, or by taking a dip at the pool. Paddlers have their canoes, kayaks and SUPs out on the water as well, and fishing season is well underway. The wineries are busy with tastings, and by late July fresh cherries and peaches are up for grabs at local fruit stands and markets.

With Fall comes the harvest. People travel to this region from September to October to gather fresh and delicious locally grown fruit and vegetables to fill their pantries for the winter season through canning, making pies and jam, and more. During the first week of September, the Creston Valley Fall Fair takes place to celebrate the bounty of this harvest. This time of the year is also stunning in the mountains, getting to those ridges to see the colours as they creep across the valley before the snow flies.

When Winter settles in, it's time to swap the gear and bring out the snowshoes, ski touring equipment, Nordic skis and any other way to play on the snow. Toboggans encouraged. It's also the perfect time of year to spend time skating or swimming at the Community Complex, taking in local entertainment such as hockey games and trivia nights, and enjoying all of the amazing shops, cafés and restaurants in town. Don't miss the craft fairs and markets during the holiday season!

WHILE visiting the Creston Valley, or during the planning phases of your upcoming trip, you'll quickly come to realize there are many unique and interesting things that set the Creston Valley apart from other areas in BC. We're here to help with the process! Here are our Top Ten interesting facts about the Creston Valley.

- TIME ZONE. Creston Valley does not observe Daylight Savings Time, staying on Mountain Standard Time year-round. This means the local time does not change during the year which can be confusing when travelling. Be sure to check the local time before you arrive or ask a local when you get here!
- CLIMATE. Creston has the third longest growing season in BC and one of the mildest climates in the interior of BC, making it ideal for growing cherries, grapes, and just about anything else!



- GRAIN ELEVATORS. You can't miss the iconic twin grain elevators in Creston, two of only four still standing in BC.
- KOOTENAY RIVER. The Kootenay River flows north rather than south from Idaho through the Creston Valley into Kootenay Lake before flowing out north at Nelson, BC. This river is also home to Sturgeon Fish, which are considered "Living Fossils" the second oldest living creature behind crocodiles.
- 5 KOOTENAY PASS. A 35-minute drive west from Creston, this is one of the highest mountain pass roads in North America open year-round and is a mountain lover's paradise.
- NAMESAKE. The Town of Creston was named by railroad surveyor Fred Little after a town he had worked in Creston, lowa. It was incorporated as a municipality May 14, 1924.
- YAHK. This sleepy village was once a bustling town with a population of 3000

- that supplied over three million rail ties for the Canadian Pacific Railroad.
- KTUNAXA PEOPLE. The Creston
  Valley area is the traditional territory of
  the Yaqan Nukiy tribe of the Ktunaxa
  First Nations, famous for their uniquely
  designed Sturgeon Nosed Canoes, used
  to traverse the area rivers, lakes, and
  wetlands of the Kootenay River and Lake
  to fish and hunt.
- CRESTON VALLEY WILDLIFE
  MANGEMENT AREA. This is a Ramsar
  designated bird sanctuary, an important
  habit for Migratory birds in Western
  North America, and home to many
  unique species such as the Western
  Painted Turtle and Leopard Frog.
- EAST OR WEST KOOTENAYS?
  Neither! With the Purcell Mountains
  on the east side of the Creston Valley,
  the Selkirk Mountains to the west and
  Kootenay Lake to the north, Creston is
  the definition of central.

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**IN** British Columbia, spending time recreating is an extension to every-day life. Here in the Creston Valley, it is no different and with such diverse and expansive offerings, the exploration feels almost endless.

Year-round, mountains, trails, rivers and lakes can be discovered and explored in the beautiful and pristine environment this valley offers. #### **CARLA AHERN**

Kootenay-Columbia Discovery Centre Society

I grew up exploring the beaches and ocean off Vancouver Island's east coast with my family. My Dad was a marine biologist and he shared his knowledge and passion for the marine environment with us. My fondest childhood memories involve poking gooey ducks and sea anemones in the pools of the intertidal zone, turning over rocks to find baby crabs and digging for clams.

After graduating from university, I veered towards jobs in the conservation biology realm: studying herring, northern spotted owls, desert tortoises and northern leopard frogs (the latter bringing me to Creston). I worked in many nature museums and interpretive centres delivering programs and tours related to the natural world. I didn't necessarily plan to go into environmental education (EE), but it evolved as I realized how much I loved sharing my passion and interest for nature and sparking curiosity about the natural world in others.

It has been my honour to be a part of the EE community in the Creston Valley since 2005. I moved here from the coast for a six-month seasonal position at the Creston Valley Wildlife Management Area (CVWMA) and I never left. Creston has a rich history in EE, with an Interpretive Centre in the wetland of the CVWMA since 1974. I am so proud to be a part of that story and be involved in the strong fabric of EE in the Kootenay region as it continues to grow and thrive.

- Q. One thing that surprises people about the Creston Valley is... the vast array of agricultural goodies that can be found here. Farm fresh everything is available!
- Q. My favourite time of year here is... the spring because everything comes alive as the valley greens up, migrating birds arrive in huge flocks, and the cycle of life is evident everywhere you look. Everything just feels so alive.
- Q. Don't leave the Creston Valley without... exploring the trails of the CVWMA (totally biased here) to take in the sights and sounds of this amazing wetland!
- Q. In my opinion, the best place to watch the sunset is... my deck lol! We have an unobstructed view of the sun setting on the Skimmerhorn (Purcell) mountain range and it's pretty fantastic! For a similar perspective, hike up Balancing Rock trail to the first look out and you can enjoy the same view.

**WITH** five main hiking areas in the Creston Valley, there are many choices when it comes to hiking, trail running and snowshoeing throughout the year.

#### MOUNT THOMPSON TRAILS

On the East side of the Creston Valley in the Purcell range, Thompson Mountain is home to a network of five trails that wander up and on top of Mount Thompson, including Sullivan Creek and Thompson Rim Trails.

# 2 GOAT (ARROW) MOUNTAIN TRAILS

Backing onto the Town of Creston's northern boundary, Goat Mountain is home to two easily accessible trails that meander through the forest – Billy Goat Bluff and Lady Slipper Trails.

# 3 CRESTON VALLEY WILDLIFE MANAGEMENT AREA TRAILS

In the West Creston area of the CVWMA, the Corn Creek Marsh and Summit Creek areas provide five loop trails along boardwalks and dykes through the wetlands, marshes and bird habitat.

#### ∠ MOUNT CRESTON TRAILS

Just west of the CVWMA Trails, this network goes up, around, and behind Mount Creston to provide stunning vistas of the wetlands and valley including Balancing Rock, Fern Forest, Summit Creek, and Mount Creston Trails.

#### KOOTENAY PASS TRAILS

West of Creston in the Selkirk Mountains along Highway 3, the Pass provides trails through ancient cedar groves and to the tops of high mountain peaks popular in both summer and winter. Highlights include Ka Papa Cedars, Ripple Ridge and Cornice Ridge Trails.

#### **BACKCOUNTRY TRAILS**

For those with 4x4 vehicles and experience, the area features a few rustic back-country trails including **Haystack**Mountain Trail in Kianuko Provincial Park and Mount Midgely Trail to the North-West of the Creston Valley.

For more detailed descriptions pick up a copy of the new Creston Valley Hiking Map, available at the Creston Valley Visitor's Centre and other local businesses.

And, check out the pull-out map in this Guide to see the locations of the hiking areas.

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WHILE some prefer to gain heights and spend time within the mystical woods and on the stunning peaks of Creston Valley's mountains, others are drawn to the Valley floor and the many opportunities the bodies of waters and waterways provide. Creston Valley is home to lakes, rivers and wetlands, each drawing recreationalists for different attractions and pursuits. During your stay, find the time to cool down and rejuvenate on the water.

#### **PADDLING**

Home to a number of rivers and lakes, paddlers are drawn to these waterways for kayaking, canoeing and SUPing.

A popular launch point on the Kootenay River is the Old Ferry Landing where you'll also find picnic tables and a parking area. Kootenay and Duck Lakes are also popular, with Kuskanook Harbour the nearest launching point on Kootenay Lake and the CVWMA Launch at Sirdar a good access point for Duck Lake.

#### **SWIMMING**

With the warm and sunny climate found in the Creston Valley, finding the perfect swimming hole is the perfect way to cool down and reward yourself after the day's adventures. Popular local swimming holes are found on both the Goat and Moyie River, and of course the Kootenay Lake. If you're looking to spend more time relaxing in the sun, consider visiting the Goat River Park or Twin Bays Beach on Kootenay Lake.

#### **FISHING**

There are 17 known species of fish found in the ponds, channels, rivers, creeks and lakes of the Creston Valley Management Area permits required (crestonwildlife.ca). The popular species to fish are the large-mouth bass and yellow perch in the ponds and channels and on Duck Lake, which boasts some of the best large-mouth bass fishing in BC. If you're looking to fish trout, make sure to visit the Goat, Kootenay River or head out on the waters of Kootenay Lake.

#### **WETLANDS AND WILDLIFE**

The Creston Valley Wildlife Management Area (CVWMA) supports an impressive array of biodiversity with over 300 bird, approximately 60 mammal, 17 fish, 6 reptile and 6 amphibian species that have been recorded. Additionally, there are thousands of invertebrate and plant species! CVWMA has an extensive network of flat-top dyke trails which are easy to access throughout the year and offer amazing opportunities to be immersed in the wetlands and wildlife in this area.



THE Creston Valley is also known for its winter pursuits including snowshoeing, cross country skiing and ski touring!

#### **SNOWSHOEING AND XC SKIING**

While Creston is mostly snow-free in the winter, you can still find beautiful snowshoeing on the Kootenay Pass, including accessible family friendly snowshoeing along Ka Papa Cedars Trail. Additionally, enjoy snowshoeing or cross country skiing along the ungroomed trails located at Corn Creek and Summit Creek Areas within the Creston Valley Wildlife Management Area (CVWMA) during the late winter.

#### **SNOWMOBILING**

The Kootenay Pass also provides great opportunities for snowmobiling along a number of trails maintained by Kokanee Country Snowmobile Club, including two overnight cabins. Learn more about membership fees and hut rentals at kcsc-bcsf.silkstart.com.

#### **SKI TOURING**


Stagleap Park located at the top of Kootenay Pass is known for its incredible "slack-country" ski touring options, with routes to Ripple Ridge on the south and Cornice Ridge on the north side of the highway. Book ski in stays at the nearby Ripple Ridge and Lightening Strike cabins, available through the Ripple Ridge Cabin Association, rippleridge.ca.

When recreating in the backcountry during the winter, it's important to be on top of avalanche conditions. Visit avalanche.ca for forecasts. Also, Kootenay Pass is an important habitat for sensitive species like mountain caribou and wolverines. Keep pets on a leash and avoid disturbing these species if encountered.











**THERE** is an abundance of amenities in this valley, including parks, playgrounds, community facilities and studios.

#### **PARKS**

Centennial Park, located in the Town of Creston, features a Splash Park that's perfect to help cool the little ones down on those hot summer days while you sit back and enjoy the giggles. In the heart of downtown Creston Millennium Park is popular for its outdoor performances, Japanese Garden as well as the nearby Dog Park and BMX Park. If you're looking for a baseball diamond, head to Canyon Park (which also includes a horse-riding arena), or Lister Park which is also home to a playground, an outdoor hockey arena, and the very popular Disc Golf Course.

#### **REC COMPLEX**

The Creston & District Community
Complex is a world class amenity in the
valley, with an indoor pool and sauna, and a
gym that hosts a variety of fitness classes.
This complex also houses the curling and
skating rinks! Outdoors, you'll find the new

Skateboard and BMX park that was inspired by its natural surroundings, integrating skateable faux rock walls and banks. This multi-tiered park is yet another great addition to the other outdoor recreational amenities at the complex, including the playground, pickleball courts, beach volleyball courts, horseshoe pits and baseball and soccer fields.

#### YOGA AND MOVEMENT

Additionally, make sure to check out the Yoga Room and Embody Movement Studio, both of which offer in studio and live stream classes including yoga, dance, hypropressives, core and more.

#### **GOLF**

Finally, links lovers should check out the **Creston Golf Club**. Established in 1954, the club is a playable course for all levels and is a great walking course, with gently changing elevation on both nines. It's the perfect way to spend a sunny day in the Valley.



#### **TAMMY BRADFORD**

Creston Museum

I got into heritage/culture almost by accident. In my early teens, I loved history but not museums - they were such dusty, boring places with none of the action and interaction that I loved about history. That changed on a cross-country family vacation to the Fortress of Louisbourg, Nova Scotia the first-person interpretation brought the history I loved to life. I thought it would be fun to do this as a summer job and spent a summer working as an interpretive guide on the SS Moyie in Kaslo. I've changed locations, but not much else, still trying to make local history fun, intriguing and fascinating for anyone who listens long enough to get me started.

When I began working here, a lot of museums especially in small communities really only told the pioneers' stories. Now they're being told alongside the stories of later generations, non-European communities, First Nations people, and more importantly, we're working hard to tell those stories from the perspectives of all those different communities. There are a lot more voices in museums than there used to be, literally and figuratively: the voices of the people portrayed in the exhibits and programs, as well as the voices of people visiting. We still have a lot of work to do, but that's where the field is going and it's very exciting.

I enjoy connecting people to a local story or getting visitors so caught up in a story that they need to hear the end of it, like a really good book or movie. Sometimes we get to connect people with their own story - I once helped a young woman "meet" her grandfather who passed away before she was born. That's pretty powerful.

Q. One thing that surprises people about the Creston Valley is... how awesome the Museum is? But also, while there's everything you need within a ten-minute walk in one direction, a ten-minute walk in another puts you in the middle of nature.

Q. My favourite time of year here is... mid-September to early-October because I love the colours - vivid yellow cottonwoods against a brilliant blue sky. There's nothing more beautiful.

Q. Don't leave the Creston Valley without... visiting the Creston Museum and the Wildlife Area.

Q. In my opinion, the best place to watch the sunset is... anywhere you can see the evening sun reflecting off the Skimmerhorns, really. I love the Skimmerhorns.

#### **ARTISTIC ATTRACTIONS**





Legend Logos

WE opened our retail store, Legend Logos in 2004 after being a home-based business that travelled to pow-wows and Indigenous conferences to sell our wares, mostly moccasins and jewelry at that time. There are always challenges and changing times in retail, but for the most part it is a lot of fun. The best part of our experience has been meeting people and listening to their journeys. We literally have people from all over the world visit us, alongside the strong support from our local community. Many people return to our place to reconnect with us and if we can share a bit of our culture or traditional teachings with others, we are happy to do so to build this bridge of connection.

COVID-19 hit tourism (which is connected to retail) in a very negative way. We combatted this by launching a website (legendlogos.ca) to allow continued access for retail sales. To partially replace our Legend Lake Tours, we provided virtual tours and document some of the teachings of the Flatbow Kutenai. Our new venture – LEGEND Truths – is a network channel on Public Place Network which allows

global streaming of our videos and content. This channel allows interested people and groups to view "Voices of the Ancestors-Teachings of the Flatbow Kutenai," "Yeuke'kam," "Wolf and Two Point Buck," and recordings being worked on. We also plan to encourage others to post videos of the special sites in the Kootenays as well as on Indigenous Tourism. The goal is to host a full spectrum of videos for people interested in our teachings, songs, traditions and news stories. thepublicplace.online/en/channel/legend-truths.8189






Q. One thing that surprises people about the Creston Valley is... how welcoming the community is. We hear all the time that, 'people here are so friendly.'





Fishing is also an opportunity to slow down the pace, with great spots along the Goat River or at Duck and Kootenay Lake.



can be reached from Lethbridge, Fernie, and Cranbrook, via Crowsnest Highway 3 while Highway 95 junction at Cranbrook connects Calgary, Banff, Invermere and Golden. Cranbrook is also home to the Canadian Rockies International Airport, with daily flights from Vancouver and Calgary.

Creston and Yahk can also be reached from Vancouver, Osoyoos, Castlegar and Nelson via Crowsnest Highway 3, with Highway 97 junction at Osoyoos connecting to Kelowna and the Okanagan.

#### HIGHWAY 3-A FROM THE NORTH




#### IDAHO STATE HIGHWAY 1 & US 95 FROM THE SOUTH


#### KINGSGATE/EASTPORT BORDER CROSSING
